Introduction and Opening Remarks



David E. Weinstein

Director, Center on Japanese Economy and Business, Columbia Business School; Carl S. Shoup Professor of the Japanese Economy, Columbia University

David E. Weinstein is the Carl S. Shoup Professor of the Japanese Economy at Columbia University. He is also the director of the Center on Japanese Economy and Business (CJEB), co-director of the Japan Project at the National Bureau of Economic Research (NBER), and a member of the Federal Economic Statistics Advisory Committee. Previously, Professor Weinstein was chair of the Department of Economics and a senior economist as well as a consultant at the Federal Reserve

Bank of New York, the Federal Reserve Bank of San Francisco, and the Federal Reserve Board of Governors. Prior to joining the Columbia faculty, Professor Weinstein held professorships at the University of Michigan and Harvard University. He also served on the Council of Economic Advisors from 1989 to 1990.

His teaching and research interests include international economics, corporate finance, and the Japanese economy. Professor Weinstein earned his PhD and MA in economics from the University of Michigan and his BA at Yale University. He is the recipient of many grants and awards, including five National Science Foundation grants, an Institute for New Economic Thinking grant, a Bank of International Settlements Fellowship, and a Google Research Award. Professor Weinstein is the author of numerous publications and articles.



Takatoshi Ito

Director, Program on Public Pension and Sovereign Funds, Center on Japanese Economy and Business, Columbia Business School; Professor, School of International and Public Affairs, Columbia University

Takatoshi Ito, Professor, School of International and Public Affairs, Columbia University (since 2015) and Senior Professor, National Graduate Institute for Policy Studies (since 2016), has taught extensively both in the United States and Japan since finishing his Ph.D. in economics at Harvard University in 1979. He taught at the

University of Minnesota (1979-1988), Hitotsubashi University (1988-2002), and the University of Tokyo (2004-2014). He held visiting professor positions at Harvard University, Stanford University, Columbia Business School, and University of Malaya. He has distinguished academic and research appointments such as President of the Japanese Economic Association in 2004; Fellow of the Econometric Society, since 1992; and Research Associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research since 1985. Ito served as Senior Advisor in the Research Department at the International Monetary Fund from 1994-97, Deputy Vice Minister for International Affairs at the Ministry of Finance of Japan from 1999-2001, and as a member of the Prime Minister's Council on Economic and Fiscal Policy from 2006-08. He is an author of many books including *The Japanese Economy* and more than 70 refereed journal papers. He frequently contributes op-ed columns to the Financial Times. He was awarded the National Medal with Purple Ribbon by the Government of Japan in June 2011 for his excellent academic achievement.

Anita M. George is Executive Vice-President and Deputy Head of CDPQ Global. She fills a key role in developing CDPQ's activities in its three priority international areas: the United States/Latin America, Europe and Asia Pacific. She actively participates in positioning CDPQ internationally, as well as developing and executing its globalization strategy. In addition to her role managing the international offices, Ms.

Ms. George joined CDPQ in April 2016 as Managing Director, South Asia. Keiko Honda is Adjunct Professor and Adjunct Senior Research Scholar of Columbia University's School of International and Public Affairs, where she teaches ESG (Environment, Social and Governance) investing to graduate students.

Honda was appointed as a board member of Mitsubishi UFJ Financial Group and AGC in 2020. She also serves as Adjunct Professor of Hitotsubashi University and a member of the United Nations Investment Management Committee.

Until the end of October 2019, Honda was the Chief Executive Officer of the Multilateral Investment Guarantee Agency (MIGA), the political risk insurance and credit enhancement arm of the World Bank Group. MIGA supports cross-border equity investors and lenders by providing coverage against currency inconvertibility and transfer restriction, expropriation, war and civil disturbance, breach of contract, and non-honoring of financial obligations.

Before joining MIGA, Honda was the first woman Senior Partner in Asia at McKinsey & Company, where she advised financial institutions on corporate finance and strategy and business development for 24 years.

Honda holds a bachelor's degree in consumer economics from Ochanomizu University and an MBA from the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School, where she was selected as a Fulbright Scholar.

Doug Peterson has served as President, Chief Executive Officer and a member of the Board of Directors of S&P Global since 2013. He joined the Company in 2011 as President of Standard & Poor's Ratings Services.

In addition, he serves on the Advisory Boards of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation's Systemic Resolution Advisory Committee, the US-China Business Council and the Kravis Leadership Institute, and the Boards of Trustees of Claremont McKenna College and the Paul Taylor Dance Company.

Dr. Catherine L. Mann is the Global Chief Economist at Citibank since February 2018 where she is responsible for thought leadership, research guidance of a global team of economists, and cross-fertilization of research across macroeconomics, fixed-income, and equities. Prior to this position, she was Chief Economist at the OECD, where she also was Director of the Economics Department and was Finance Deputy to the G20 (2014-2017). Prior to the OECD, she held the Barbara '54 and Richard M.

Rosenberg Professor of Global Finance at the International Business School, Brandeis University, where she also directed the Rosenberg Institute of Global Finance (2006-2014). She spent 20-plus years in Washington, DC (1984-2006) where her positions included Senior Fellow at the Peter G. Peterson Institute for International Economics; Economist, Senior Economist, and Assistant Director in the International Finance Division at the Federal Reserve Board of Governors; Senior International Economist on the President's Council of Economic Advisers; and Adviser to the Chief Economist at the World Bank.

Dr. Mann received her PhD in Economics from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and her undergraduate degree is from Harvard University. Her written work includes more than 85 scholarly articles and seven books primarily on the topics of US external imbalances, trade, international capital flows and the dollar; and information technology and services trade in global markets.



Masataka Miyazono
President, Government Pension Investment Fund (GPIF)

Masataka Miyazono is President of Government Pension Investment Fund (GPIF) since April 2020. Prior to his role at GPIF, he was President of the Pension Fund Association.

Previously, Mr. Miyazono served as Vice-President and Supervisory Committee member at The Norinchukin Bank. Since 1976, he held various leadership positions

in the areas of management and others at The Norinchukin Bank, including, Senior Managing Director, Managing Director, General Manager of Corporate Planning Division, General Manager of Human Resources Division, Executive Secretary, Deputy General Manager of Coordination Division, Deputy General Manager of Corporate Planning Division, Director of Coordination Division, and Director of Treasury Division. He also served as General Manager at the Kumamoto Branch of the Bank.

Prior to joining Citadel in 2018, Mr. Ubide was a Managing Director within the Investment Strategy Group at Goldman Sachs, where he oversaw G10 economics and fixed income strategy. Previously, he served in senior roles at the hedge funds

D.E. Shaw and Tudor Investment Corporation. He began his career as an Economist at the International Monetary Fund (IMF).

In parallel to his financial services career, Mr. Ubide has been deeply involved in the global policy discussion, largely as a Senior Fellow at the Peterson Institute for International Economics. He is a member of the Advisory Council on Economic Affairs of the Spanish Government, of the Steering Committee for the Euro 50 Group, and of the Economic Club of New York.

Mr. Ubide has published extensively on exchange rates, monetary policy, and European policy issues. His book, The Paradox of Risk, was published in 2017. He has been an economics columnist at El Pais, a Spanish newspaper, since 2001.

Mr. Ubide received a bachelor's degree from the University of Zaragoza in Spain and a PhD in Economics from the European University Institute in Florence, Italy.

With imposed stress on public pension systems across advanced economies due to growing aging populations, many countries have created or reformed public pension funds to finance future shortfalls in pension contributions. Under the guidance of Professor Takatoshi Ito, CJEB established the Program on Public Pension and Sovereign Funds ("PPPSF"), which examines and conducts extensive research on how public pension funds and sovereign wealth funds should be structured, both in portfolio and governance. This program focuses on public pension fund reforms across Japan and other global economies, and how Japan can learn from other public pension fund reforms to enhance its Government Pension and Investment Fund (GPIF). Similarly, the GPIF can serve as a model for structuring other public and quasipublic pension funds in Japan and other emerging market economies with the intention of setting up or reforming its own funds.
